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Special Central Assistance for Tribal Development

1. Background

India has the single largest tribal population in the world, comprising of 8.6% of its total population and 11.3 percent of the total rural population. The population of Scheduled Tribes (STs) in the country, as per Census 2011 is 10.45 crore. Special provisions have been enshrined in the Constitution to protect the interest of ST population. Besides, other special legal provisions have been put in place to safeguard to the interests of STs as mentioned below:

1.1 Constitutional Safeguards

- 1.1.1 Recognizing the special needs of various weaker sections including **STs**, the Constitution of India not only guarantees equality before the Law for all (**Article 14**), but also enjoins upon the State to make special provisions of affirmative discrimination for the advancement of any socially and educationally backward classes, (**Article 15(4)**).
- 1.1.2 'It also empowers the State to make provisions for reservation in appointments or posts in favour of any backward class citizens which in the opinion of the State is not adequately represented in the services under the State (**Article 16(4)**).
- 1.1.3 It confers rights towards protection of Interests of Minorities (which also includes **STs**) (**Article 29**) and right to conserve distinct Language, Script or Culture has been guaranteed through **Art. 350**.
- 1.1.4 It enjoins upon the State to promote with special care the educational and economic interests of the weaker sections of the people and, in particular, **the STs** and promises to protect from social injustice and all forms of exploitation (**Article 46**).
- 1.1.5 For promoting the welfare of **STs** and for raising the level of administration of the Scheduled Areas to that of the rest of the State (**Article 244**), and special financial assistance is ensured under the Constitution (**Article 275 (1)**).
- 1.1.6 Reservation of seats for the **STs** in the House of the people and in the State Legislative Assemblies; educational institutions; and in services is another measure of positive discrimination in favour of these Groups (**Articles 330, 332, 335**).
- 1.1.7 Reservation of seats in Panchayats (**Art. 243**) and Special provisions in respect of NE States and Sikkim (**Art. 371**).
- 1.1.8 It also empowers the State to appoint a Commission to investigate the conditions of the socially and educationally backward classes (**Article 340**) and to specify those Tribes or Tribal Communities be deemed to be as **STs** (**Article 342**).

- 1.1.9 Fifth Schedule to the Constitution refers to the administration and control of the Scheduled Areas and the Scheduled Tribes in any State, other than the States of Assam, Meghalaya, Tripura and Mizoram by ensuring submission of Annual Reports by the Governors to the President of India regarding the Administration of the Scheduled Areas and setting up of Tribal Advisory Council to advise on such matter pertaining to the welfare and advancement of the Scheduled Tribes (**Article 244(1)**).
- 1.1.10 Sixth Schedule to the Constitution refers to the administration of Tribal Areas in the States of Assam, Meghalaya, Tripura and Mizoram by designating certain tribal areas as Autonomous Districts and Autonomous Regions and also by constituting District Councils and Regional Councils (**Article 244(2)**). It enables Autonomous District Councils and Regional Councils to be constituted in those areas with a fair amount of legislative and executive powers.
- 1.1.11 To ensure effective participation of the tribal in the process of planning and decision-making, the 73rd Amendment of the Constitution have been extended to the Scheduled Areas through the Panchayats (Extension to the Scheduled Areas) Act, 1996.

- 1.2.10 The right to fair compensation and transparency in land acquisition, rehabilitation and resettlement Act, 2013 has specific provisions to safeguard the interest of STs.
- 1.2.11 There are many other Acts and guidelines administered by various Central Ministries and Departments which have specific provisions to safeguard the interest of STs in the country including reservation in admission, protection of habitat, development of tribal region etc.

1.3 Tribal Sub-Plan: Government has taken a number of initiatives for development of STs, which have yielded positive outcomes, and have also resulted in narrowing the gap between the Scheduled Tribes and the rest of the population in respect of various development indicators. Tribal Sub-Plan (TSP) [now called as Scheduled Tribe Component (STC) at central level] has been the dedicated source of funding for the tribal development across the country. Major part of infrastructure development in tribal dominated areas and provision of basic amenities to tribal people in the country are carried out through various schemes / programmes of concerned Central Ministries and the State Governments. MoTA supplements these initiatives by way of filling gaps. Despite best efforts of the Government, there still exist gaps in socio-economic indicators, which demands focussed approach for their development.

1.4 In this backdrop, the Scheme 'Special Central Assistance (SCA) to Tribal Sub-Scheme (TSS)', which is part of the Umbrella Scheme for Development of Scheduled Tribes, is directed towards providing grants to States / UTs for accelerating tribal development and strengthening institutional arrangements. The scheme came into existence as Special Central Assistance to Tribal Sub-Plan (TSP) of States. After the end of the 12th Plan, its nomenclature was changed to Special Central Assistance to Tribal Sub-scheme. The purpose of the scheme is to play catalytic role in overall development and welfare of tribal people and tribal dominated areas as an additive and supplement to the schemes of Central Line Ministries and State Governments.

1.5 The existing ongoing scheme 'SCA to TSS' has been playing the supplemental role to the efforts of Central Line Ministries and State Governments catering to improvement in development indices of target areas and ST people. The outcome of the scheme per se cannot be directly attributable to the scheme alone as major part of the initiatives will be undertaken by the concerned Ministries and/ or State governments/UT Administrations.

1.6 During the year 2019-20, MoTA conducted a gap analysis on data available at Census 2011 and Mission Antyodaya maintained by Ministry of Rural Development (MoRD). Through the analysis it was found that there are about 145000 tribal villages with ST population $\geq 25\%$ where gaps exist in various sector of development including health, education, livelihood, housing, road connectivity, mobile internet connectivity, vocational training, drinking water, electric supply etc. (**Annexure 1**). In consideration of these gaps, the Sectoral Group of Secretaries – 5 (Welfare) in its meeting under the chairmanship of Cabinet Secretary on 9th October, 2020, directed Ministry of Tribal Affairs (MoTA) to quickly prepare an Action Plan for a campaign on the line of Gram Swaraj Abhiyan aimed at filling gaps in basic services and facilities in villages that have a sizeable tribal population. However, it is felt that the existing gaps cannot be completely fulfilled through the suggested Abhiyan but long-term planning would be required to saturate these tribal dominated villages with requisite infrastructure and other basic services besides carrying out the Abhiyan. It is imperative to have a continuing scheme where integrated Village Development can be implemented in an outcome-oriented and time bound manner. It is, thus, decided as a part of policy decision that the focus of the scheme be shifted to integrated Village Development by way of appropriate convergence. Accordingly, the objective of holistic development of tribal dominated villages in the existing scheme has been included.

1.7 In addition to this, presently states having notified Scheduled Tribes are given grants under the scheme and Union Territories (UTs) are not included. As a result, STs living in these UTs are deprived of benefits of development tailored to suit their needs. In the context of erstwhile State of J&K which is now two Union Territories, viz., Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh, special assistance earlier available to these areas for tribal development can continue only if the scheme is extended to cover Union Territories. Further, States and UTs may not have indigenous tribal population but States like Punjab and Haryana and UTs of Chandigarh and Delhi have sizeable

migrant tribal population. Measures for their protection and welfare need to be taken care of, for which enabling provision is required. Accordingly, it has been decided to cover all States and Union Territories having notified STs as also the locations / destinations / States / UTs which houses tribal migrants also to target tribal development and not limited to assistance to sub-schemes. Appropriate head is to be created to enable transfer of funds to the Union Territories.

1.8 In view of the transformed nature of the Scheme for holistic development of tribal, the nomenclature of the scheme would be changed from ‘Special Central Assistance to Tribal Sub Scheme (SCA to TSS)’ to ‘Special Central Assistance for Tribal Development (SCA for TD)’. The SCA for TD scheme will aim towards integrated development of tribal dominated villages as model village (Adarsh Gram) in a phased manner wherein ST people have access to basic services and infrastructure facilities to enable them to lead dignified living and utilize their inherent potential to the fullest. Through the scheme, it would be endeavoured to mitigate existing gaps in various sectors of development including education and health services; quality of life; basic amenities; housing; employment; productive assets; income-generating opportunities and infrastructure incidental thereto etc. though appropriate convergence.

2. Vision of the Scheme

The Scheme ‘SCA for TD envisions to make the tribal dominated villages as ‘Adarsh Gram’ wherein ST people have access to basic services and infrastructure facilities to enable them to lead dignified living and utilize their inherent potential to the fullest.

3. General Features of the Scheme ‘SCA for TD’

The Scheme ‘SCA for TD’ is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme from 2017-18 wherein 100% Grant from GOI is given to States.

4. Objectives of the Scheme

The main objective of this Scheme is to ensure integrated development of tribal dominated villages in a phased manner by ensuring the following.

a) Adequate Infrastructure:

All requisite infrastructure incidental to socio-economic development are to be provided under the Scheme based on the felt need and available resources.

b) Improvement in Socio-Economic Indicators

The identified gaps in the socio-economic indicators will be mitigated to the fullest possible in terms of health and nutrition, drinking water, education, housing, livelihood, electric supply, road connectivity, mobile & internet connectivity, farm and non-farm activities, skill and entrepreneurship development, market interventions, financial inclusion, social security etc.

c) Providing flexibility for focused interventions for the welfare and development of tribal people and areas

- d) **Capacity development of elected representatives to institutions of local self-government from among Scheduled Tribes**
- e) **Enhanced capacity to avail opportunities, gain rights and entitlements and improved facilities at par with other social groups, and**
- f) **Protection against exploitation and oppression.**

4.1 The particulars of the 55 Monitorable Indicators to improve socio economic development is as under:

4.2 These Monitorable Indicators will be taken into account while formulation of annual plan and declaring the selected tribal villages as 'Adarsh Gram'. Each of the Monitorable Indicator is expected to be above the benchmark in order to obtain a Score of 2. A tribal village can thus achieve a maximum Score of 100.

5. Approach and Strategy

- a. Integrated development of selected tribal villages will sought to be achieved primarily through implementation of the existing schemes of Central and State Governments in a convergent manner thereby ensuring access to quality services as well as infrastructure incidental thereto. Funding for gap filling will be provided for meeting critical gaps in the tribal dominated villages while resorting to convergence of resources available with State Government and Central Line Ministries for tribal development to fetch optimal results.
- b. A certain number of ST dominated Villages will be taken up for integrated development every year depending upon various factors e.g. willingness of State/UT Govts. to implement the Scheme, availability of funds, submission of Utilization Certificates, unspent balances, assurance for convergence of resources etc. The funds under SCA will be released in the first year as 'Gap-filling' component in these selected tribal villages, which will be utilized as per the provisions contained under General Financial Rules (GFR), 2017 as amended from time to time. However, funds available through convergence of resources will continue to be made available by State for mitigating the identified gaps in the socio-economic indicators in subsequent years as well. MoTA will review the progress of Monitorable Indicators through online monitoring system or otherwise as decided by MoTA for time to time and at least once in a year.
- c. Even while tribal villages selected in a particular year achieve desired level of development through the intervention under the Scheme, they may aspire to improve further and hence these villages can again be included under the Scheme in coming years for receiving multiple rounds

of funding for different sets of goal provided that the Village Development Plan (VDP) for Adarsh Gram is successfully completed.

6. Fund flow of the Scheme:

The Scheme will thus have two components as under:

- a. **Convergence of Schemes:** The twin objectives of providing adequate infrastructure and improving socio-economic indicators will be sought to be achieved by convergence various Central and State Government's Schemes meant for welfare and development of STs. The development deficit of the selected tribal village arising out of the baseline data vis-à-vis the Monitorable Indicators will form the basis of convergence between the various existing Central as well as State Government Schemes. An indicative list of Schemes that need to be converged for development of infrastructure and socio-economic programmes is at **Annexure 2**.
- b. **'Gap-filling':** Funds under this scheme will be utilized as 'Gap-filling' to supplement the financial resources garnered by the State for undertaking various activities under village development plan. The State Government shall clearly delineate the source of funding for undertaking various activities while submitting Village Development Plan to MoTA.

7. Preparation of Village Development Plan (VDP):

- a. The purpose of the VDP is to prepare a comprehensive, realistic and practical blueprint for development of the selected Villages into an 'Adarsh Gram' in a definite time-frame (say about five years) as a part transforming India into Atma Nirbhar Bharat. The starting point for preparation of the VDP based on the important developmental needs for the village as per identified gaps as a whole.
- b. Firming of necessary developmental needs will be worked out as per the Format I, II, and III. While Format I capture the Village level Data and Format II captures the Village level Infrastructural needs, Format III captures the Family/Individual needs at the village level. As such Format II and Format III together capture information for each of the Monitorable Indicators listed in para 4. Format II and Format III also together capture the Action Plan proposed for fulfilling the Infrastructure and Family/Individual needs (gaps) for each of the Monitorable Indicators.
- c. The Village Development Plan (VDP) is to be prepared as per Format IV, V and VI. Format IV and V are a consolidation of the Action Plans already captured in Format II and III and hence reflect the VDP for Infrastructure and Family/Individual needs respectively. Format IV and V also serve to monitor monthly progress of fulfilling the needs.
- d. While planning for infrastructure it is to be noted that funds can be accessed from Central Schemes, State Schemes, SCA for TD and also from STC components and the same have to be specified in Format IV.
- e. Format VI reflects the status of Monitorable Indicators. If this is based on the initial needs assessment, Format VI will be a reflection of the baseline position of the Monitorable Indicators. As and when needs are addressed, the socio-economic indicators will improve and hence Format VI

can be accordingly updated. If needs assessment is carried out every year, Format VI can then be comprehensively updated but in the meanwhile it can be updated monthly based on monthly progress captured in Format IV and V.

- f. The whole exercise of the Need Assessment, data collection, gap analysis and preparation of VDP will be done by District Planning and Monitoring Committee (DPMC) with the help of ITDP / ITDA/ MADA / Clusters. The VDP duly approved by the Gram Sabha of the village and recommended by DPMC will be submitted to the VDP Working Committee at the State level for further approval. Department (In-Charge of Tribal Development) i.e. the Nodal Department will play the nodal role for finalization of VDP to be included in the Annual Plan of SCA for TD. While granting approval, the VDP Working Committee would ensure that the VDP is a robust plan with adequate and suitable convergence with other Schemes for saturating the infrastructure needs of the village and would lead to desired improvements in the Monitorable Indicators. Thereafter, it would be made a part of the Gram Panchayat Development Plan (GPDP).
- g. The Nodal Department will explore the feasibility of availing and channelizing Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) funds and District Mineral Funds (DMF) in carrying out the developmental works in the select villages.

8. Selection of States and Villages

The Scheme will cater to all the tribal dominated villages decided by MoTA based on the criteria approved by the Project Appraisal Committee from time to time. In the first phase of five years, 36428 villages with at least 50% tribal population and 500 STs (**Annexure 3**) will be taken up under the scheme. The villages adopted under Sansad Adarsh Gram Yojana and under Aspirational Districts will be given priority. Further, villages adopted for development through CSR funds and DMF will also be given priority.

9. Funding Pattern

Fund under the Scheme will be provided as 100 % Grant-in-Aid to the State. Funds up to the tune of Rs.22.62 lakh per village will be provided for new villages to the State as 'Gap-filling' component for carrying out approved activities including for administrative and other expenses i.e. technical resource support, training and capacity building, awareness generation, publicity etc. at State, District and Village level. An amount upto 2% of the total allocation under the Scheme will be used for defraying administrative expenses by the Ministry / States on demand only based on priority.

10. Flow of Funds

Financial assistance under the Scheme will be released by the Central Government to the States/UTs in two installments. The first installment, up to 50% of the admissible grant, will be released immediately on selection of the tribal villages to enable State/UT Governments to carry out capacity building, awareness generation, need assessment, preparation of Village Development Plans including the works identified for undertaking from the 'Gap-filling' funds. The balance admissible Central Assistance would be released in respect of the VDPs finalized by the Gram Sabha as 2nd installment. Initially, the State Government/UT Administration will release the entire admissible funds under 'Administrative Expenses' to the District Administrations for carrying out

capacity building, administrative expenses, awareness generation and initiating non cost based activities. Thereafter remaining admissible funds under the 'Gap-filling' component will be released by the State Government to the District Administration once the VDP of the selected villages is approved by their District Planning and Monitoring Committee (DPMC) so that the planned works can be executed without any delay.

11. Technical Resource Support for Adarsh Gram Villages

- a. At the National level, there will be a Project Monitoring Unit to provide technical resource support for the Scheme.
- b. Similarly, at the State and District levels, Department (in-charge of Tribal Development) will act as Nodal Department and District Planning and Monitoring Committee (DPMC) / ITDP / ITDA / Clusters will provide technical resource support for the implementation of the Scheme.
- c. Following functions will be performed:
 1. Orientation of State Government officials and key functionaries at District Level and below.
 2. Preparation of training modules for key functionaries at different levels.
 3. Training of key functionaries involved in planning, implementation and monitoring of the Scheme at all.

12. Training and Capacity Building

Convergent implementation of the ongoing Central and State Plan Schemes in tribal villages will require identification of the village needs, systematic listing of all Central & State Plan Schemes relevant for development of the tribal dominated villages and preparation of the VDPs accordingly. Thus, a clear understanding needs to be developed regarding the basic features of each of such Schemes by persons and bodies responsible for planning, implementation and monitoring of SCA for TD. The State Government will take up necessary training and capacity building of the Scheme functionaries at all levels with the help of concerned departments providing technical resources support.

13. Awareness Generation and Publicity

Awareness generation through Information, Education and Communication (IEC) in the selected villages and in the concerned Blocks and Districts should be undertaken by the State Government /UT Administration to give wide publicity to the Scheme. Besides, social messages on aspects relating to the various socio-economic indicators of hygiene, health, nutrition etc. can be disseminated.

14. Role of Nodal Department

At the State level, the Department (In-charge of Tribal Department) must be the nodal department authorized to lead the process of tribal development. The nodal department will work in close coordination with all relevant line departments. Directions of the Tribal Welfare Department must be made binding on the line Departments. Nodal department will be responsible for appraisal of the perspective document as well as TSP schemes of different departments for inclusion in Annual Village Development Plan (VDP). The Nodal Department shall also be responsible for monitoring and evaluation of the VDP approved under the scheme.

14.1 The Nodal Department shall:

- i. Identify socio-economic indicators to highlight development deficits of ST population
- ii. Conduct a critical gap analysis to assess the deprivation of STs on identified socio-economic parameters
- iii. Identify priority-areas under TSP in consultation with line Departments to fulfil the objectives of VDP.
- iv. Prepare a comprehensive Perspective Plan and Annual TSP documents taking into account various sources of funding.
- v. Grant approval for re-appropriation of TSP funds from one department to another after mid-year review to meet the requirement of VDP.
- vi. Undertake scrutiny of the schemes/programmes submitted by the line departments to ensure that
 - (a) concerned departments are providing for STs in their budget and plans funds and guidelines to the same extent as is available to other populations, in proportion to their requirement;
 - (b) only those schemes/programmes, that full-fill the criteria of securing direct benefits to ST individuals, households and localities and are aligned to the strategic objectives of VDP are included.
 - (c) Service delivery standards under various departmental schemes are established and adhered to.
- vii. Design a comprehensive monitoring framework with well-defined indicators
- viii. Devise a mechanism for speedy transfer of funds directly to field formations under intimation to District Headquarters, instead of being routed through District Headquarters, by enforcing on them a system of accountability for effective utilization of the funds.
- ix. Conduct evaluation to assess the impact of the interventions under VDP on the socio-economic conditions of STs on regular basis.
- x. Ensure the follow up of the schemes implemented and maintenance of proper records on assets created etc.
- xi. Ensure that service delivery is standardized and adhered to in time-bound manner.
- xii. Ensure transparency and accountability at all levels in the implementation of VDP and dissemination of information electronically relating to schemes/programmes, allocation and expenditure along with physical targets and achievements in respect of each department and placing this information in public domain.
- xiii. Ensure that all the institutional mechanisms are established at various levels, i.e State, District, Block, Gram Sabha etc. as laid down in the guidelines.

15. Institutional Arrangements

To effectively discharge its mandate, the Nodal Department will be adequately strengthened through technical support group, knowledge leadership, analytical functioning in areas pertaining to strategic planning, demand assessment, gap analysis, long-term impact of schemes/programmes and collection of related data for evidence-based planning and decision making, capacity building at all levels etc. The State government may provide an appropriate percentage of State TSP allocation towards evaluation and monitoring activities, after optimal utilization of their existing resources, including manpower. The States/ UTs shall establish the following institutional structures and mechanism for effective formulation, implementation and monitoring of TSP.

15.1 State Level

VDP Working Committee will have the following composition duly approved by Chief Secretary of the State Government:

Principal Secretary / Secretary (In-charge of Tribal Development) -Chairperson

Secretaries or a nominated officer of all concerned line departments - Members

15.1.1 Key functions:

- (i) Appraisal of the perspective VDP perspective document and Annual VDP.
- (ii) Monitoring implementation of Annual VDP.
- (iii) Evaluation of implementation of Annual VDP.
- (iv) The VDP Working Committee shall submit its report on the above matters and emerging issues to the Chief Secretary of the State Government.
- (v) The VDP Working Committee will hold its meetings every three months.

15.2 District Level

District Planning and Monitoring Committee (DPMC) will have the following composition:

Dy. Commissioner /District Collector- Chairperson

Project Officers of ITDP/ITDA - Secretary District level officers- Members

Other members as prescribed by the Nodal Department.

The DPMC shall also have representation from local legislative and parliamentary constituencies.

15.2.1 Key functions:

- (i) Formulate VDP at the Districtlevel.
- (ii) Get VDP approved by the District PlanningCommittee.
- (iii) Review the implementation of VDP everymonth.
- (iv) Communicate the quarterly Performance Review Report to the PDP Working Committee.

15.3 Gram Panchayat Level

Gram Panchayat shall review the implementation of Village Development Plan in the villages on a monthly basis and apprise the status of implementation to the Gram Sabha in its next meeting in the presence of representative of Block / Tehsil besides forwarding the report to the DPMC through on-linesystem.

16. Social Audit

The States/UTs shall set up its own Social Audit Programme with the involvement of elected representatives, beneficiaries and reputed voluntary organizations/NGOs/CSOs. Even within the geographical boundaries of the Gram Sabha, as tribal habitations are scattered at large distances, States/UTs shall design social audit programmes such that these are undertaken at the level of the ST cluster or habitation. States/UTs shall undertake to develop adequate capacities amongst the inhabitants of the cluster/habitations.

17. Transparency andAccountability

The States/UTs shall make their Nodal Departments responsible for ensuring transparency and accountability at all levels in the implementation of VDP and for placing information relating to schemes/programmes, allocation, expenditure, physical targets and achievements in respect of each Department in public domain. Further, the following measures shall be taken:

- (i) Each department of the State/ UT shall host relevant documents, as decided by the Nodal Department, in public domain.
- (ii) The Nodal Department may ensure the follow up of the schemes implemented and maintenance of proper records on assets created under VDP in District/Block etc.
- (iii) The States/UTs shall onboard on the centralized web enabled MIS with software engineered data to make all information regarding release of funds and expenditure against each scheme/programmes, physical progress, etc to be equally accessed by and monitored in public domain and for faster information exchange between the various stakeholders through the network.
- (iv) Any other measure as expedient to do so for ensuring better transparency and accountability from time to time with approval of Nodal Department.

18. Approval Process

17.1 Proposals received from the State Government(s) will be placed before the PAC for appraisal and approval. Project Appraisal Committee (PAC) in Ministry of Tribal Affairs (MoTA) shall consist of:

18.3 PAC will appraise, approve and / or make suggestions relating to on-going / past / future projects funded under SCA for TD.

19. State and National-level Awards for Best Performing Villages

To encourage the States to implement the Scheme in a holistic manner in their States, upto three best performing villages from each State/UT will be selected on the basis of defined parameters by a designated Selection Committee to be constituted by MoTA. For this purpose the selected villages will be given an award of Rs. 5 lakh each. Further, 03 villages amongst these villages will be selected for National Awards of Rs. 10 lakheach.
